


## The Project Begins!





On Friday, the kids took to the gym to set up their shops and sell to their classmates. They were creative and very excited about earning and spending money. Some of the products included bookmarks, stress balls, necklaces, pet rocks, bows, baked goods, and even a mini coffee shop, decaf, of course! The students will be able to turn in their profits for classroom coupons and prizes.
