The trainer made it clear that the training was not just for school violence, but any type of emergency that might occur, including fires, tornadoes, chemical spills on the highways or railroad tracks going through Kalkaska, etc.

Monday, January 20, all staff at Kalkaska Public Schools were trained in a safety and security protocol by the I Love U Guys Foundation. The training lasted from 8 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. and covered the standard response protocol and the standard reunification method.

In addition to KPS staff, Forest Area Community Schools, Excelsior School District #1, Sheriff's Department deputies and other local emergency personnel attended.

The training was made possible by a Community Policing Grant awarded to the Kalkaska County Sheriff's Department and coordinated by Live Well Kalkaska.

More than 300 members of the Kalkaska County Community now have a common language in the event of an emergency.

Congrats to Mrs. Stewart for writing and receiving a grant from MEEMIC Insurance for classroom supplies.


REYS

Help us keep events safe and enjoyable for everyone. We appreciate your cooperation. Game management reserves the right to remove spectators and/or vehicles that do not comply.


